

# **Washington County Partners with Tualatin**



Washington County Land Use & Transportation (LUT) is focused on collaborating with the City of Tualatin. The 124th Avenue extension, which includes a partnership with the Willamette Water Supply Program for installation of a transmission pipeline, is a prime example of a Tualatin-LUT collaboration addressing the transportation needs of Tualatin and the Basalt Creek area.

The 124th Avenue extension includes a \$30 million, two-lane arterial between Tualatin-Sherwood and Grahams Ferry roads, with safety improvements to other area roads, resulting in 4.4 miles of new and/or improved roadway. The extension will provide another route connecting Tualatin and Wilsonville, along with access to land designated for future industrial and employment development in Tualatin, Sherwood and Wilsonville. As private

development occurs, the road will be widened to five lanes.

The ground-breaking for the 124th Avenue Extension and Willamette Water Supply Pipeline Projects will be **1 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 12**, at the south side of Tualatin-Sherwood Road and SW 124th Avenue. This is a rain or shine event. Construction is expected to begin in December or January.

Collaboration between Wilsonville, Tualatin and the County led to the completion of the Basalt Creek Refinement plan, which laid out a transportation network to serve future development. Transportation projects like the 124th Avenue extension are key to unlocking future development, as identified by the Industrial Site Readiness Project, another partnership between LUT, Tualatin and other cities.

Washington County continues to identify future transportation needs in Tualatin and all of Washington County. The County was awarded regional funding to initiate the environmental analysis to extend 124th Avenue beyond Grahams Ferry Road to Boones Ferry Road. Longer-term transportation needs for the Tualatin area are also being evaluated as part of the Washington County Transportation Futures Study.

### Winterization and Fall Clean-Up

As the winter season nears, it also initiates many changes in the services provided by the Operations Department.

#### Some items include:

- The interactive Crawfish water fountain at the Commons Lake will be closed for the season.
- Light pole banners, hanging flower baskets, and other flower beds have been removed.
- All outdoor public drinking fountains will be shut off to protect them from freezing.
- Ibach Park, Browns Ferry Park, Jurgens Park, and the Commons Lake restrooms will each have one restroom remain open for the winter.
- Decorative lights are being strung in the trees around the Commons Lake in preparation for the holiday season.

### Hydrant Flushing Program and Maintenance

Tualatin's fire hydrant flushing program enhances water quality, verifies proper operation of hydrants and valves, and ensures hydrants are operational in case of a fire emergency. Flushing can cause temporary discolored water while fine sediment particles are flushed. If you have discolored water, try flushing with cold water for a few minutes. # **Thankful for Volunteers**



Thank you to the over 2,300 volunteers who gave their time and talent to make Tualatin a great place to live, work and play! Volunteers are everywhere in our City.

They are Dog Park Ambassadors, Crew leaders, photographers, park clean up advocates, invasive species champions, administrative heroes, Eagle Scouts and TEAM Tualatin. They are commission/advisory board members, reserve police officers, fingerprint technicians, trail counters, library shelvers, tech tutors, homework helpers, magazine magicians and story time aides, just to name a few.

This year volunteers supported Tualatin and enhanced their community's environment by contributing over 7,700 hours of their own time. The impact of these volunteers is found in the preservation and restoration of our parks, green spaces and public areas. Can you claim to have been to a park and left a positive mark when you left? Volunteers helped improve our parks by planting 10,000 trees and shrubs in Tualatin. These volunteers got a little dirty and wet to reduce their carbon footprint; filter surface runoff; provide native forage for birds; and provide green spaces for generations to come. We all have busy schedules, but for just a few hours each month, you and some of your neighbors have taken the opportunity to change Tualatin forever.

The City of Tualatin has been a leader in volunteerism and environmental stewardship for decades, in a region and state already renowned for being "green". Tualatin has an active partnership with Tualatin River Keepers, Friends of Trees, Wetlands Conservancy, the Nature Conservancy, and Clean Water Services. These groups welcome the opportunity to serve with the dedicated volunteers of Tualatin.

In the Library, we are extremely grateful to have over 200 active library volunteers who have contributed over 6,400 hours of their valuable time. Maintaining the Tualatin Library as the cultural centerpiece of our city involves the work of volunteers who shelve books and media, check-in returned items, fulfill patron requests and assist our librarians with the programs, services and collections that our community enjoys. Volunteers enable the Library to fulfill its mission to provide all citizens with access to the widest range of materials and services which fulfill their informational, educational, and cultural needs.

We are thankful for volunteers, thankful for an involved community and thankful for the opportunity to serve the volunteers of Tualatin.

### **Smoke-Free Outdoor City Spaces**

The Tualatin City Council is considering a policy regarding outdoor smoke and tobacco free City spaces. Key issues include what may be restricted, such as tobacco and vapor, and which locations may be included, such as all City owned and managed property, or only selected areas like parks and the Library plaza. #### **Southwest Corridor Plan**

The Southwest Corridor Project is focused on studying high capacity transit (HCT) from Southwest Portland to Tigard and Tualatin. The City of Tualatin partnered with Metro, TriMet, ODOT, the cities of Portland, Tigard, Sherwood, Durham, Beaverton and Washington County to study the proposed alignment. The project team has been evaluating multiple alternatives along the alignment to present to the Steering Committee, which is made up of representatives from each of the partner agencies.

Recently, the Steering Committee discussed the Tigard and Tualatin alignments as well as direct service options to Portland Community College (PCC) Sylvania Campus. The Steering Committee is scheduled to make a decision regarding the preferred terminus location in December 2015. In February 2016, the steering committee will select a mode, which could be bus rapid transit or light rail. In February, they will also determine if direct service to PCC will continue to be studied.
