Due to the vacancy, the Council has decided to move forward with an application process which will be followed by interviews and a formal selection. in December. RECOGNIZING COMMUNITY PARTNERS THROUGH GRANTS

Every year, the Tualatin City Council dedicates funding towards supporting community partners that provide vital needs and services to residents in our community. In August, the Council invited organizations to apply, inquiring about the services they provide and how they support local residents. At the September 12 work session, the Council awarded \$25,000 to nine agencies. These agencies include Community Action Organization, Community Warehouse, Domestic Violence Resource Center, Good Neighbor Center, Neighbors Nourishing Communities, Sexual Assault Resource Center, Tigard-Tualatin Compassion Clinic, Tigard-Tualatin Family Resource Center and the Tualatin School House Food Pantry. All of these programs bring tremendous support to Tualatin citizens, and the City Council is honored to help fund these programs that give so much to our community.

NOVEMBER IS VETERAN’S APPRECIATION MONTH

The Tualatin City Council has proclaimed that November is Veteran’s Appreciation month and joins the community in celebrating and supporting the dedicated service of our military. Tualatin has a large population of veterans and has always supported our veteran population, including becoming a Purple Heart City. EXTENSION OF SW 124TH AVE MOVES FORWARD

The SW 124th Avenue Extension Project, which has long been a priority for the City of Tualatin, is continuing to move forward. Over the summer, grading and excavation started at the site of the extension near Tualatin-Sherwood road, and Washington County anticipates that paving will begin in the Spring of 2017, depending on weather conditions.

Further down, at the future intersection of SW 124th Ave and Tonquin Road, the alignment was completed by demolishing a portion of the old road. New walls are being built to complete the intersection and make way for the new Basalt Creek Parkway.

Basalt Creek Parkway, the other key component to this new route, is underway as well. The bridge over the railroad is near completion and Washing County anticipates that this portion of the road will open in spring 2017.

CELEBRATING 40 YEARS AS A COOPERATIVE

In 1976, Washington County asked voters to approve the first countywide funding measure to support public library access for all residents. At the time, more than half the population of Washington County did not have free public library access. This levy provided funding enabling the six cities with public libraries to freely open their doors to any county resident.

Library service in Tualatin began the same year, through the WCCLS “Book Van.” The Tualatin Public Library opened and joined the Cooperative in 1977. Being part of a cooperative means Tualatin residents have access to more than 1.6 million items in the countywide collection. The shared system also provides easier access to ebooks, online resources, and other materials.

Voters have continued to support countywide tax funding for WCCLS. WCCLS and member libraries appreciate the faith you have in libraries’ ability to offer quality collections, programs, and services to Washington County families.

Your Passport to WCCLS

Discover the world of the Washington County Cooperative Library Services with a commemorative Passport to our member libraries. The Passport provides an incentive to explore neighboring libraries and to be inspired by the many unique experiences our public libraries offer. Through December 16 visit a library to pick-up a Passport and then collect a stamp at each location you visit.

December 1-16 present your Passport at a WCCLS member library and receive one drawing ticket for each library stamp in your Passport. Prize drawings will be held on December 20. (Repeat winners are not allowed.)

Returning ballots can be easy, too. There is a ballot box outside the Tualatin Library at 18878 SW Martinazzi Drive. Ballots must be received by 8:00 pm on November 8. This drop site is open to any voter, regardless of address.

WINTERIZATION & FALL CLEAN-UP



As the winter season nears, it also initiates many changes in the services provided by the Operations Department.

Some items include:

- The interactive Crawfish water fountain at the Commons Lake will be closed for the season.
- Light pole banners, hanging flower baskets, and other flower beds have been removed.
- All outdoor public drinking fountains will be shut off to protect them from freezing.
- Ibach Park, Browns Ferry Park, Jurgens Park, and the Commons Lake restrooms will each have one restroom remain open for the winter.
- Decorative lights are being strung in the trees around the Commons Lake in preparation for the holiday season.



NEIGHBORS NOURISHING COMMUNITIES REDUCES HUNGER DURING THE HOLIDAYS

Neighbors Nourishing Communities (NNC) is a local non profit whose mission is *to reduce hunger and strengthen communities through gardening*. NNC has dozens of volunteers in the local area, many of whom donate produce from their gardens in exchange for free plants and seeds. We also support low-income families with tools, plants, seeds, instruction, and gardens of their own. NNC has had a fantastic year. More than 1,800 pounds of organic produce have been grown and donated. We estimate that our volunteer gardeners retained at least 4,000 pounds of nutritious food for their own families. In addition, we had 12 families who were supported with gardens, several of whom also donated to others in need.

This year we began a new relationship with MITCH Charter School. NNC and students built four rolling germination stations complete with grow lights. These six foot tall rolling units can produce 800 seedlings every 6-8 weeks. Most of the year students will use these for science and agricultural education, but two months out of the year they raise all the plant starts for NNC’s legion of volunteer gardeners. The students do a fantastic service to the community and were extremely helpful at the plant handout in May.

This year our most successful gardener is also our biggest business supporter. Since NNC’s inception, the Tualatin Park Veterinary Clinic has offered their property to low-income families in need of a place to garden. This year the staff at the Clinic expanded and supported four families with large raised bed gardens as well as having their own clinic garden. From the staff’s garden, and some donations by clinic clients, they raised over 525 pounds.

We’re so proud of MITCH Charter School and Tualatin Park Veterinary Clinic. Broad-based community support for the well-being of others is what makes Tualatin such a great place to live.
