TUALATIN PREPARES FOR THE BIG ONE

In June the City of Tualatin participated in a regional disaster response and recovery exercise called "Cascadia Rising". The purpose of this event was to practice the response plans and procedures that the City would take in the event of a natural disaster. This specific activity revolved around the potential emergency response that would be required for a subduction zone earthquake. The timeline of events over two days followed a similar pattern to the events that took place following the major 9.0 earthquake off the coast of Japan in 2011.

A number of agencies participated in this activity, including nearby cities, Washington County, local fire district TVF&R as well as a number of other emergency preparedness agencies throughout the state and West coast region. This coordinated event provided staff with the opportunity to practice their skills in running the emergency operations center, and to streamline the process of coordinating support responsibilities across multiple agencies and teams.

The city's efforts help our organization and operations teams prepare for a big earthquake, or smaller localized event that would activate a similar emergency response. There are ways that you can help prepare for a disaster too! What can you do to be prepared? Here are a few tips:

- Reach out to your local CIO president and participate in a Map Your Neighborhood exercise
- Participate in a local CERT training


END OF SUMMER READING CARNIVAL

SUMMER VOLUNTEERS BUILDING A HEALTHY COMMUNITY

TEAM Tualatin volunteers spent 8 weeks this summer contributing to the health and appearance of our City. 75 tweens and teens served 3,000 hours this summer completing projects for the Operations Division. A VISION FOR HEALTHY FOOD AND FUN FOR THE COMMUNITY



Tualatin envisions a community with access to a variety of locally grown healthy, fresh food. The Tualatin Tomorrow Community Vision has outlined this in the vision with an action calling for an expanded Farmer's Market.

This year, Tualatin Tomorrow is excited to welcome the new Bridgeport Farmer's Market to its group of partners helping to implement the community vision.

The Bridgeport Farmers Market is in its first season, and will run through September 28. Each Wednesday, the market offers fresh, local food and goods from over 70 vendors. The market is located in the street from AT&T to Shoe Mill, and Shoe Mill to Lululemon Athletica.

It features live music from 4-8pm, and "Kids in the Kitchen" segments from 5-7pm helping kids learn to cook using fresh fruits and veggies supplied from our Farm vendors.

By shopping at the market, you are also helping to fight hunger! Local Farmers such as Simington Gardens and Lee Farms are helping fight hunger by donating fresh produce to Market Pantry, a food relief program that provides nutritional support to local families in need.

GAUGING TUALATIN'S APPETITE FOR FOOD TRUCKS

On June 13, 2016, the Tualatin City Council voted to adopt Ordinance No. 1393-16, which immediately and temporarily allows mobile food units (e.g., push carts, stationary carts, mobile food trucks and catering trucks) to operate while the Council considers permanent regulations. This is in response to limiting language in the City's current development code that restricts vehicle type and size, location, and hours of operation.




Temporary regulations allow mobile food units to operate on private property with the consent of the property owner in all commercial and industrial planning districts, but they are prohibited in residential and institutional districts; operations on City property and public rights-of-way are subject to the permitting requirements found in the Tualatin's municipal (TMC) and development (TDC) codes. The temporary regulations are available on the City's website at TUALATINOREGON.GOV/PLANNING/TEMPORARY-MOBILE-FOOD-UNIT-REGULATIONS-FAQ. The ordinance does not impose limits on hours of operation. Potential food truck operators must first

obtain a business license from the City pursuant to TMC 09-01, in addition to a license from the Washington County Department of Health and Human Services.

This ordinance will automatically expire on December 31, 2016, allowing City staff to observe and collect data on food truck operations within the city of Tualatin, and providing the opportunity to incorporate real world data into options to allow such facilities to operate on a more permanent basis. This ordinance is seen as a tool to gauge Tualatin's appetite for food trucks into the near future. The City hopes to take new mobile food unit regulations to City Council in late fall or early winter.

All City Council and Advisory Committee meetings are open to the public and provide an opportunity for citizen comment.


The agenda and packet materials are available for review in the Library, City offices and at TUALATINOREGON.GOV generally seven calendar days prior to the Council meeting.

TUALATIN POLICE AUGUST CAR SEAT CLINIC

On Saturday, August 20, from 9:00am - 12:00pm, Tualatin Police will host a Child Passenger Safety Seat Check-Up event at the Tualatin Police Department, 8650 SW Tualatin Rd. Certified Child Passenger Safety Technicians and volunteers will check for correct seat installation, damage, recalls, and size and age appropriateness. Instruction will be given to parents and caretakers on proper seat installation.

Motor vehicle crashes are the number one cause of death among children ages 1 to 19. Of those children ages 12 and under who died in vehicle crashes, a large percentage of them were unrestrained. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration research shows that seven out of 10 children are improperly restrained, putting them at risk of injury or death.

Citizens are asked to bring their child and manuals for their vehicle and child passenger seat. For further information, contact Jennifer Massey with the Tualatin Police Department 503.691.4846.
