

SUMMER ROADWORK 2016

The 2016 Pavement Maintenance Program has started and will continue through the summer. The City Council approved the \$600,000 budget for the 2016/2017 Pavement Maintenance Program in May 2016.

The projects in this year's budget consist of crack sealing, slurry sealing and overlays. The Operations Department will make every effort to keep citizens apprised of the work locations and dates by using the City of Tualatin website, Facebook, posted signage, door hangers and direct contact with businesses.

Slurry seal area homeowners will be notified through door hangers two weeks prior to the work being completed and will be reminded two days before road closures.

This year's projects include: Overlays on Avery Street between 95th Avenue and Teton Road, 105th Avenue from Avery Street to Moratoc Drive, and a section on Dogwood Street.

The practice of applying the "Right Treatment to the Right Road at the Right Time" is what keeps Tualatin roadways in such good condition. Thanks in advance for your patience during this maintenance program and remember to "Give em a Brake!"

SO YOU WANT TO RUN FOR CITY OFFICE?

Election season is here and Tualatin City Council. Positions 2, 4, and 6 will be voted on this year in the general election to be held November 8, 2016.

The position of City Councilor serves to make decisions including adopting City laws and changing them as needed, determining policies and setting standards, adopting the City budget and recommending City taxes and fees, and approving major expenditures. Council members also represent the City on regional committees. Council positions serve four-year terms commencing at the first Council meeting in January 2017, and expire December 31, 2020.

IT'S ALMOST CRAWFISH FESTIVAL TIME!



The Tualatin Crawfish Festival is back this August 5-7 for the 66th year! The First Annual Tualatin Crawfish Festival took place in 1951 to honor the newly built VFW Hall. During this year crawfish inhibited the Tualatin River to excess. Thus, the idea of Crawfish Festival was born.

The festival is presented by Columbia Bank. Friday's kickoff event is at Tualatin Commons with food vendors and the Pacific Seafood Mystery Box Chef Cook-off beginning at 5:30pm. The fun continues with the high-energy sounds of Hit Machine in concert at 7:30pm.

Saturday the fun moves to Tualatin Community Park with the annual pancake breakfast sponsored by Village Inn and the "Crawfish Crawl" a 5K, and 10K, and half marathon run and walk. Other events include the "M Bank" Oregon Corks and Kegs micro beers and wine tasting, the MudBay "Atsa My Dawg Show," the annual Legacy Meridian Park Medical Center adult crawfish eating contest, and the Fred Meyer kids' area with many great activities and two giant bounce houses. Live music will grace the MegaFluid Systems main stage and many Cajun food options are available for purchase as well as the live crawfish boil. Saturday night's headline act is the Patrick Lamb Band at 7:00pm.

The festival continues on Sunday, August 7, until 6:00pm. This year features the "Teddy Bear Checkup" sponsored by Vitality Northwest. Kids who bring their teddy bear to the festival for a health check will receive free admission to the festival. To celebrate the "Route 66" theme, we will also welcome the "Crawfish Cruise In" a classic car show from 12-3:00pm. The Corks & Kegs area and all food and vendor booths will continue through Sunday. Sunday's entertainment headliner is fan favorite Dancehall Days who will appear on the main stage at 3:30pm.

Saturday and Sunday daily admission is \$4.00 for adults and \$2.00 for children. The Friday events are free—thanks to the Ford Experience tour. For more information visit TUALATINGAWFISHFESTIVAL.COM.

SOLVING NEIGHBORHOOD PROBLEMS THROUGH COLLABORATION



When the Ibach CIO was formed in late 2011, it quickly became apparent that the preeminent concern of the CIO's residents was the dangerous conditions at the intersection of SW 105th, SW Blake Street and SW 108th Ave, an area known as the Garden Corner Curves. The roadway slopes and curves dramatically through the Curves, and there are no bike or pedestrian facilities, much less a shoulder on the road. Over the years, several accidents have occurred in the Curves, as well as countless "close calls" experienced by bikers and pedestrians traveling through the area.

In early 2012, the CIO began working with the City to rectify the dangerous conditions in the Curves. The process began with a forum for residents to express concerns and suggest solutions. In 2013, the CIO and City collaborated on the installation of pedestrian-activated beacons in the Curves, as well as widening of the shoulder on Blake Street.

In 2014, the City agreed to fund a capital improvement project for a Design Alignment Study, which is scheduled to begin in July of this year and will include numerous opportunities for public input. The Study will ultimately produce a concept plan for a roadway and associated facilities that provide safe passage for all modes through the Curves.

The Study would not have been possible without the urging of the CIO and the financial and human resources provided by the City. Using this model for collaboration, residents of other CIOs can begin the process of solving problems in their respective neighborhoods.

On May 31 I helped celebrate, along with our community partners, the grand opening of Trimet's bus line 97. Starting back on June 6, this new bus route provides local weekday service between the WES Commuter Rail station and the Sherwood Plaza along Tualatin-Sherwood road.

The new bus line operates in conjunction with the Tualatin Shuttle, operated by Ride Connection, to connect people to their jobs and hopefully relieve some congestion.
