While the community enjoyed spending Friday evenings with the Market, they believe changing to Saturday mornings will attract a greater number of shoppers looking to purchase local produce and other food. Adjacent to Nyberg Rivers, the new location has greater visibility and allows the market to join the thriving community growing in the heart of Tualatin. With morning hours, they will now extend the season through September, offering the full summer harvest to our shoppers. Some of the crowd favorites are back, but there will be many new vendors for to check out. Be sure to join in the fun at the grand re-opening on Saturday, June 13, from 8:30 am to 12:30 pm, and then every Saturday morning (including July 4) through September 26!

The market is a great place to connect with neighbors. Thanks to City donations, the market features local, live musicians every Saturday. They proudly accept the Oregon Trail Card, and Tualatin's New Seasons Market matches SNAP funds, up to \$10 per week. Our Market Sprouts program empowers local children to make healthy decisions as food consumers, and citizens can learn about area non-profits at our Community Booth. New this year, the market & library are partnering to promote Summer Reading registration and to present a Saturday morning Storytime June 13 to August 8 (except July 4).

Initially conceived in conjunction with the Tualatin Tomorrow Vision implementation, the market continues to be an important community partner and participates

#### **Teen Librarian Wins State Award**

Tualatin Public Library Teen Librarian Aimee Meuchel received the Oregon Young Adult Network You're Excellent Award at the 2015 Oregon Library Association conference, recognizing her positive and significant contribution to teens in Oregon libraries. The award included a \$100 donation to support teen library services.

Several local teens nominated Meuchel for the award, sharing comments such as: "Without her guidance and support throughout the years, I would have never grown out of my shell or realized how much I enjoy helping others." Meuchel has worked at the Tualatin Library since 2006. Because of Meuchel's efforts, Tualatin Library has a highly successful teen program, seeing more than 600 visits to the Teen Room each month.

# Chiefton-Dakota Greenway Volunteer Project

The City of Tualatin built the Chiefton-Dakota Greenway Project, located South of Blake Street just West of Martinazzi Ave, two years ago which connected trails to sidewalks in the area and treated storm water runoff from an older neighborhood needing storm water treatment. The area has become a vibrant living native ecosystem in the midst of the city where many plants flourish.

In an effort to keep this area flourishing, 460 Tualatin High School students volunteered to do necessary upkeep of the area in coordination with the city. On May 7-8 students removed 15 cubic yards of invasive plant species such as Reed Canary Grass, lvy and Blackberry. The students also planted 250 native shrubs and trees where invasive plant species were removed to promote the eradication of the invasive plant species.

The students' efforts have greatly improved the area for both the functional cleaning of the storm water, the use by small animal wildlife, and the natural aesthetic value for trail users.



### **Tackling Traffic in Tualatin**

Transportation and relieving congestion are very important to residents and businesses in Tualatin. This is a top priority for the City Council. Tualatin has been working on a number of solutions to provide relief both now and in the future.

#### **124th Extension Project**

The project will provide a connection between Tualatin -Sherwood Road and Grahams Ferry Road, through the Basalt Creek Concept Plan area. The connection will include the extension of 124th Avenue from Tualatin – Sherwood Road to Tonguin Road. Washington County is leading this project. The 124th extension is estimated to cost \$30 million. The project is expected to start in August 2015. Additionally, when funding becomes available, Basalt Creek Parkway will be constructed to extend from the intersection of 124th Avenue and Tonguin Road to Grahams Ferry Road. #### **Ride Connection**

Ride Connection is a **FREE** commuter shuttle intended to get people from local bus or WES service to their jobs. Ride Connection took over operations of the Tualatin Shuttle from the Tualatin Chamber of Commerce in October 2014. Since then, Ride Connection has been evaluating the routes available and the needs of riders. There are now two routes, the new red line started on May 4, 2015. #### **Pedestrian Improvements**

A new sidewalk was installed to fill a sidewalk gap on Pacific Drive between East Street and West Street adjacent to the Angel Haven Mobile Park. The new sidewalk was installed as a part of the neighborhood solutions program

to provide a safe route to transit and Pacific Highway.

#### **Tualatin River Greenway Trail**

The City is developing a new segment of the Tualatin River Greenway Trail that will connect people with nature, provide recreational and transportation opportunities and promote health. The trail begins at Barngrover Street near the Library, crosses under Interstate 5 at the Tualatin River to Nyberg Lane. Construction will take place in the summer and fall of 2015 and will be open for public use in the winter of 2016

#### **Southwest Corridor Project**

The City in partnership with Metro, TriMet, ODOT, Tigard, Portland and other jurisdictions are working on a project to extend transit from Portland to Tualatin. Currently, multiple alignments are being considered as well as multiple modes of transportation. The mode will be either light rail transit (LRT) such as a MAX line or bus rapid transit (BRT) similar to the EmX bus in Eugene. The steering committee will make decisions about the alignment in the northern part of the corridor. in southwest Portland, this July. In December, the steering committee will decide which mode of transportation to study further and where the corridor alignment will end, which could be in Tualatin. ## Washington County Transportation Futures Study

Washington County recently started a future land use and transportation needs and opportunities study. This study provides the opportunity to: think big and look far beyond the Transportation System Plan's 20-year horizon; study the county's evolving demographic and economic conditions as well as implications for travel needs; evaluate the trade-offs from two transportation investment packages and two plausible future land use scenarios; and position Washington County for continued future success.

The project Study Advisory Committee (SAC) is made up of fourteen participants from around the County. They will meet throughout the 18-20 month process. To learn more about this study please visit www. wctransportationfutures.org.


Tualatin is in the middle of major long-term planning efforts to keep our buildings, water lines and transportation networks updated, maintained and ready to serve our future community. These were identified as some of the Council's top priorities for the next two years, and they have been part of the Tualatin Tomorrow Vision and different community master plans. The City Facilities

Study is focused on the future of a City Hall for a place where City services can be consolidated in one place. The City Council will review the study and community outreach results on June 22nd.

Traffic has long been the number one problem in Tualatin, and the article on page three highlights significant progress. These improvements require years of planning and funding, but major changes are on the horizon to help move traffic and alleviate congestion.

The water study highlighted below is one which will help us plan and make good decisions going forward as we consider future growth in the community and how it impacts our water supply and rates.

These services are essential, for our community. The City Council values your input on these projects, so thank you to all who have been involved!



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#### **Water Update**

Since last summer, a Water Supply Financial Evaluation has been underway by Tualatin and consultant HDR to determine the city's different water source options and their costs. Currently, Tualatin gets its water from Portland and a small amount from the Aquifer Storage Recovery (ASR) system for a total of 11.5 million gallons per day. Additional water will be needed to meet the peak flows in the summer of 2023.

#### The evaluation included three options;

- Continue buying water from Portland and increase capacity through the current system
- Move to the Willamette River
- Continue as a Portland customer with our current limits and add the Willamette to meet demands at build out

Over a 30-year period, staying with Portland is estimated to be cheaper than switching to the Willamette because of the initial investment of building the infrastructure. Tualatin will continue to plan and prepare for the water needs of the residents and businesses in our community.
