TEAM Tualatin is a youth volunteer program offering activities that contribute to the health and appearance of our community. Each team is comprised of 7 to 10 youth who meet June 20 – August 12, 2016; Monday-Friday from 9:00 am-3:00 pm at Tualatin Community Park. TEAM works with the City's Park Maintenance and Operation Crews completing tasks which include watering and mulching plants in Tualatin's reforestation projects, planting a garden, painting fire hydrants, washing city cars and trucks, taking care of parks, and participating in Art Splash and the Crawfish Festival. TEAM Leader Andrew Bonica, returns this year with new challenges and games.

Are you a teen between the ages of 12 and 18 who likes the great outdoors? Want to improve Tualatin's urban forests and greenways? Want to make a BIG impact in a week? ## TUALATIN TOMORROW ANNUAL UPDATES

Tualatin is a community with vision, looking to the future for how to improve the City for generations to come! Tualatin Tomorrow is a community-driven Vision for the future of our city. The Vision, a truly grassroots effort, describes the way citizens want their community to look, feel and function over a twenty-year horizon.

The Vision “action plan” outlines specific programs and projects designed to help achieve these community goals. In 2013, as part of the vision plan update, over 1,000 ideas were submitted by the community through many public meetings, online dialogue and community input. From these ideas, an updated plan was developed with 100 actions to implement over the next five years.

This year’s Annual Progress Report shows that 80% of those actions have already been implemented or are currently underway. Major progress this year includes the America’s Best Communities (ABC) Community Revitalization Plan, which recently advanced to the semi-finalist round, new transit connections announced by TriMet and maximizing access to the Tualatin River with new Tualatin River Greenway Trail connection which is opening in April. A number of these successes are documented in the Tualatin Tomorrow Annual Progress Report available at [TUALATINOREGON.GOV/TUALATINTOMORROW](http://TUALATINOREGON.GOV/TUALATINTOMORROW).

This progress is possible thanks to the many community partners who have taken the lead on these actions. The Tualatin Tomorrow Advisory Committee works in partnership with groups such as Neighbors Nourishing Communities, TriMet, the Tualatin Chamber of Commerce, Tigard-Tualatin School District, the City of Tualatin, and many more. Improving our community is a team effort!

## INTRODUCING TUALATIN'S EMPLOYEE OF THE YEAR: AIMEE MEUCHEL



The City of Tualatin Employee of the Year program is designed to recognize the work and actions of the City’s employees which bring credit to the City and improve our ability to deliver excellent service to Tualatin’s customers. This year, Aimee Meuchel, Teen Librarian in the Tualatin Public Library, was selected as Tualatin’s 2015 Employee of the Year.

Since the moment Aimee joined the City of Tualatin staff in September of 2006, she has been positively impacting the lives of youth who visit the Tualatin Public Library and who live in the Tualatin community. After being named Tualatin’s first Teen Librarian in 2008, she was instrumental in forming the Teen Library Committee, where teens help Aimee and other library staff to plan and deliver programs for teens, children and families, and the teens develop leadership, planning, and organizational skills. She developed and leads, in partnership with the library’s Volunteer Coordinator, the Summer Teen Library program in which teen participants aide the library by completing shelving and other library maintenance tasks. Aimee’s approachability, genuineness, creativity, care, and concern for the teens she mentors is what makes these and other teen programs respected, vibrant and well-recognized, as well as makes the Library Teen Room “the place to be”. These characteristics and more were reflected in the nominations submitted by Tualatin teens to the Oregon Young Adult Network (OYAN) for the You’re Excellent Award. Aimee was honored by OYAN as the award recipient 2015 Oregon Library Association Conference in recognition for her outstanding work, and positive and significant contribution to teens in Oregon libraries.

Aimee’s ability to exhibit grace under pressure, innovation, bubbly personality, and can-do attitude is admired and appreciated by all who work with her. She is a model of cooperation and support with coworkers, and delivers stellar customer service with resourcefulness, dedication, humility and good humor.

## PASSPORT EXPIRING? RENEW NOW!

Is your U.S. passport set to expire sometime in 2016? If so, the United States State Department has a message for you: Renew it now!

Officials are expecting a 10% increase in the number of passport renewals in 2016. Many of these renewals will come from 10-year passports issued in 2006/2007 – when the Western Hemisphere Travel Initiative went into effect. This post-9/11 initiative required passports for the first time from U.S. citizens flying home from Mexico, Canada, the Caribbean and Bermuda and created stricter requirements for traveling abroad. Further, the Real ID Act will be implemented, which sets stricter standards on state issued identification card.

Due to these combined factors, in addition to the normal demand for passport services, experts are estimating approximately 17 million new and renewed passports in 2016, about 1.5 million more than were issued in 2015. The average wait time for a new passport will go up to six weeks. If you are planning to apply or renew your passport, don't wait!
