PUMPKIN REGATTA RETURNS FOR THE 13TH YEAR



GARDEN CORNER CURVES CONCEPT STUDY KICKS OFF

The City is moving forward with the planning project known as the *Garden Corner Curves* or the *Curves at 105th/Blake/108th*. This phase of the project will identify a range of alternatives intended to address the problem curves for all modes of travel including cars, bicycles, and pedestrians. In an effort to understand the needs of the people who use the corridor or live nearby, this phase of the project will include an extensive public engagement process.

Earlier this summer, the City selected a consulting team to develop the concept study for the City. The project team will lead meetings with community stakeholders. There will be a project website, an online survey, and small group meetings, all designed to listen to feedback from the community and share ideas about the engineering behind various alternatives. The City's efforts will also include a video to help people visualize the project challenges and opportunities and an on-the-ground walking tour to review the site and discuss the project.

Public engagement will be integrated with the effort to identify alternatives. The design team will develop schematic designs based on input from the community and then share those design concepts with the community in an iterative approach. The goal is to identify alternative solutions that address community needs while avoiding pitfalls that can happen in the traditional engineering approach.

PARTNERING FOR BETTER PATIENT CARE

Tualatin Valley Fire & Rescue (TVF&R) has been a dedicated community partner in implementing the Tualatin Tomorrow Vision for the past decade. They work with many other community partners to improve the overall health and safety of our community.

Mobile integrated health care is a priority for Tualatin Valley Fire & Rescue.

For the past several years, TVF&R has participated in several pilot projects with local hospitals and agencies to improve outcomes for patients suffering a chronic medical or mental health condition. One of those pilots has evolved into a contract with Legacy Meridian Park Medical Center for mobile health care, where firefighter paramedics visit patients after they are discharged from the hospital, with a goal of decreasing hospital readmissions.

According to recent data, the average hospital stay for patients transported after a 911 call is 3.5 days. At discharge, high-risk patients are identified by the hospital staff and asked to voluntarily participate in the mobile integrated health care program.

A recent review of patient data showed that patients who opted not to participate in the project have a 23.5 percent readmission rate, while patients who chose to participate have a 6.3 percent readmission rate.

With the average cost for a hospital readmission ranging anywhere from \$10,000 to \$40,000, and hospitals subject to losing Medicare reimbursement for patients readmitted within 30 days, this project benefits all involved. Ultimately, patients receive better care, they stay out of the hospital, and the 911 emergency dispatch system receives fewer calls.

During home visits, firefighter paramedics perform a patient assessment; review daily weight, blood sugar, and activity logs the patient keeps; and provide nutrition education. The initial visit also includes an environmental assessment designed to decrease fall risks and create a safe living environment. Paramedics record their findings and share them with the hospital and patients' health care providers.

Is Tualatin a healthy community? Are we designing a place where healthy, active living is an easy lifestyle to adopt, and chronic diseases are what we work to prevent? How can we create a community where we live long, healthy, active lives? Former Governor Kitzhaber, realizing that surprisingly, Oregon ranked poorly in the nation in terms of health and wellbeing, launched an initiative to make Oregon the healthiest state in the US and charged the Oregon Business Council with implementation. Cambia Health Foundation committed millions of dollars to help advance this

initiative and the Business Council has used those funds to bring the Blue Zones program to Oregon. One of their strategies is to select two Oregon cities as demonstration communities to fully implement the Blue Zones program. This program is a long term, systemic community transformation in food strategies, and lifestyle and cultural practices.

The City of Tualatin, along with the City of Tigard, and community partners from the school district, healthcare providers, employers, the chamber of commerce, faith leaders, grocers, and social service providers are working to build a broad-based coalition to be the next demonstration community. In August, we submitted our proposal and were selected as a finalist, and early in October we will have a site visit to further demonstrate what impact the BlueZone program could have on our community. This is a tremendous opportunity to bring significant resources to Tualatin in terms of money and technical assistance to help us make our community a place where we and our children live long, happy and healthy lives.
