
THE ARTWALK consists of many interpretive stops, each with a map and a list of the stops on the route. We encourage you to visit all the stops.





THE ARTWALK consists of several interconnected trails. Look for maps like this one to determine the route and colorful trail markers to lead the way.

THE COMMONS LOOP circles the Lake of the Commons. On the route you will visit an interactive fountain, poetry etched in stone, and whimsical bronze sculptures.

THE PARK LOOP is 2.8 miles. You will pass Community Park where interpretive panels feature Tualatin's history and the flooding of the river and a student-created skate park mural. A spur takes you to the Ki-a-Kuts Bridge over the Tualatin River. Turn at the bronze sculpture at the Police Services building and enjoy a path through a wetland.



The short **LIBRARY LOOP** leads you to the Tualatin Public Library, home to the Tualatin mastodon skeleton and several spectacular works of art.





Project Scope

The City of Tualatin wishes to acquire works of art that visually reflect its dynamic and distinctive elements and give the viewer insight into the unique character and quality of this community. Artistic excellence combined with an eye for capturing historic, social, and natural aspects of the community *are* essential goals of the Tualatin Visual Chronicle.

Please refer to the Call to Artists section “Reference Resources” for ideas on subject matter.

Tualatin's Visual Chronicle collection is displayed in public buildings throughout the city and will be highlighted in the ArtWalk, a self-guided tour of downtown Tualatin's art, cultural and natural history.

Background Information

The city is located on the Tualatin River, 12 miles south of Portland.

Tualatin openly treasures its cultural history. In early years, the Atfalati tribe of the Kalayapua Native Americans used the Tualatin River for transportation. Oregon Trail settlers later built ferries and plied the waters with steamships. There was a brick factory and a sawmill as well. Incorporated in 1913, Tualatin grew slowly claiming less than 1,000 residents only 40 years ago. Today, it is nearing its maximum capacity of 30,000 and includes a growing Latino population, now about 12 per cent of the total. Tualatin focuses on its youth who are active in the community, benefit from involved parents, and are educated through an excellent school system.

Names of early settlers adorn natural areas and city streets, and the community logo combines the look of a tree with a Native American theme. A new pedestrian and bicycle bridge over the Tualatin River, uniting more than 200 acres of parks and open space owned by the city and its neighboring communities, was named for Ki-a-Kuts, the last leader of the Atfalati tribe.

Prehistory is celebrated in Tualatin as well. A mastodon skeleton was unearthed in a swamp near where the Fred Meyer parking lot is now. The 13,000 year-old mastodon ribcage was excavated and bones of a giant ground sloth were found. The mastodon remains are on display at the Tualatin Public Library.

Application Procedure

Direct Purchase:

Please include requested price. The selection panel will review the images and may ask to see the actual work(s) being considered.

Proposals for Commissions:

Proposals must consist of a brief description of the work proposed and requested price. There is not a limit to the number of proposals artists may submit. Proposals must be accompanied by up to 10 images of relevant past work.

For either Direct Purchase or Proposals for Commissions:

Include the following with your submission:

- A professional resume.
- Digital images may be submitted on CD, DVD or USB thumb drive and need to be labeled with artist's last name.
- Images must be saved in JPG format in highest or maximum quality (or at 300 dpi).

- Include a separate page with a list of the provided images that includes the title and description of each work, dimensions, materials used, year created and price of works.

Note: Commissioned artists will need to include two digital images with their completed works.


Selection

The Selection Jury will choose the work meeting the requirements and that best conveys the spirit of the city and its people. The Tualatin Arts Advisory Committee members will comprise the Selection Jury.

Selection Criteria

- Artwork exhibits the highest degree of excellence
- Artwork subject matter depicts a unique aspect of life in Tualatin
- Artwork was created within two years of date of selection
- Artwork produced on archival paper with archivally permanent materials
- Photos (black and white or color) are processed to archival standards
- Functional features, such as how the work will age, store, and exhibit may be considered in the selection process

Additional information

- The Tualatin Arts Advisory Committee is not required to purchase work from submissions and reserves the right to commission or purchase works from artists who do not submit.
- There is no limit on the number of works purchased for the Visual Chronicle.
- Matting and framing by Tualatin Arts Advisory Committee.
- Selected work becomes the property of the City of Tualatin.
- A City of Tualatin copyright agreement will be provided with artist contract (available for review on website).
