A. CALL TO ORDER

1. Tualatin River Greenway Gap Completion Project Update

Rich Mueller updated the committee on the interpretive concepts, power source issues and wayfinding signage for the shared use path project. The plans and design are at approximately 90% with the schedule to bid in spring and construction in summer/fall. The project remains within budget projection and is expected to be complete by the end of the year.

The report included advisory committee activities during the preceding year, and suggested recommendations, along with an action plan for 2015.

F. FUTURE AGENDA ITEMS


G. COMMUNICATIONS FROM COMMITTEE MEMBERS



Proclamation

Proclamation Declaring Saturday, May 16, 2015 as National Kids to Parks Day in the City of Tualatin

WHEREAS research shows that outdoor recreation has a positive impact on children's performance in school and overall health and it is important for children and young people to be active and eat nutritious foods to combat childhood obesity, diabetes, other diseases, and to lead happy and productive lives; and

WHEREAS everyone can realize physical, psychological and emotional health benefits through exercise, play and appreciation for nature in parks and other outdoor areas; and

WHEREAS Tualatin has an abundance of year-round outdoor opportunities in our parks, greenways and natural areas including walking, jogging, and biking on the trail system; canoeing and kayaking on the Tualatin River; viewing wildlife in native habitats, skateboarding and visiting the dog park, enjoying interactive playgrounds, and learning and appreciating Tualatin's unique cultural and natural history.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT PROCLAIMED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TUALATIN, that:

Section 1. On May 16, 2015 all citizens are urged to go forth and have fun, take the children and young people in their lives to a Tualatin, state or national park, and by this enjoyable and beneficial activity, teach children and young people the valuable roles parks can play in their lives.

SUBJECT: CONSIDERATION OF A REQUEST TO DESIGNATE A SEGMENT OF THE TUALATIN RIVER GREENWAY IN HONOR OF YVONNE ADDINGTON

ISSUE BEFORE THE TPARK:

The Tualatin Park Advisory Committee (TPARK) will consider a request to name a segment of the Tualatin River Greenway Trail in honor of Yvonne Addington.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that TPARK recommend to Council that in honor of Yvonne Addington's contributions to the mission and purpose of parks and recreation in the City of Tualatin, the segment of the Tualatin River Greenway noted on the attached Tualatin River Greenway Site Plan be officially named "Yvonne Addington Overlook."

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

A request to name a portion of the Tualatin River Greenway in honor of Yvonne Addington was received from Fred Bruning, Chief Executive Officer, CenterCal Properties, LLC (see Attachment A).

The Tualatin Municipal Code, Chapter 05-06, Memorials and Naming Policy, establishes conditions and criteria for naming public park facilities (see Attachment B). These include:

- Requests to name or rename park facilities must be in writing
- A minimum of two years has passed since the event, activity, or occurrence that generated the desire to name the park facility
- Requests be evaluated by TPARK with a staff recommendation, and result in a recommendation to Council
- Generally, naming park facilities should occur before or during development and include a public participation opportunity

STAFF REPORT: Consideration of a request to name a segment of the Tualatin River Greenway in honor of Yvonne Addington

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- Consideration should include recognition of a person's extraordinary volunteerism, employment, leadership, or similar service or non-monetary contributions to the mission and purpose parks and recreation in Tualatin.

Yvonne Addington has had a life-long public service career in city, county, and state government leading the development of planning, land use, parks and open spaces and then financing economic development, public works, parks and recreation in all cities and counties in Oregon.

Yvonne, who grew up in Tualatin, has made extraordinary and unparalleled contributions to the mission and purpose of parks and recreation in the City of Tualatin through her vision, leadership, and public administration capabilities while serving as Tualatin's first City Administrator during Tualatin's formative years of the 1960s, 1970s and early 1980s and since then through her passionate and effective volunteerism.

Contributions to the mission and purpose of parks and recreation in Tualatin.

In the 1960s the small City of Tualatin (population 359), was in the next ring of growth outside of the City of Portland. With Interstate Highway 5 running through the city, there was no choice not to grow. Growth needed to be planned well and quickly to avoid mistakes of other suburban jurisdictions. There were great obstacles to overcome. The city wells were dry, there was no sewer system or treatment available, the one room city hall not open to the public, and the City was in debt. There were only three companies employing residents. While Yvonne served as City Administrator, great efforts were made by progressive Mayors and City Councils over the next few years who hired top professional consulting firms to develop plans and construction of facilities and they opened city hall for business.

Yvonne was elected as Treasurer, appointed as city recorder/municipal judge and a couple years later City Administrator/Manager. She held board membership on the International City Managers Association, served as President of the Oregon Municipal Judges Association, and served on the State Speed Control Board, League of Oregon Cities Board, and several others. Working with the leadership of two very progressive volunteer Mayors and City Councils, plus top professional consulting firms, Yvonne led planning, funding and development of:

Financing and development of a clean and adequate water system with connection to the City of Portland Bull Run water system which is still the major source of water for the city.

Financing and development of the first sewage treatment system under threat of a building moratorium due to the pollution of the Tualatin River. Yvonne obtained federal grants and business contributions to build a new state of the art tertiary treatment plant and sewer system. The treatment plant was shortly replaced by the Regional Unified Sewage Agency (now Clean Water Services) plant at Durham.

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Development of Tualatin's Land Use Comprehensive Plan working with consultants and citizens in the development of a state approved land use plan, which laid out major open spaces, park lands, subdivision parks and trails, Tualatin River access, and street rights of way. This planning also included the first street tree ordinance, adoption of an ordinance naming city streets after Native American Tribes, creation of city street and sidewalk criteria, a sign ordinance, and formulation of an architectural review board. Also established while Yvonne served as City Administrator were dedication requirements or set asides by private development for lands for open spaces, parks, greenways, and natural areas, and restrictions on development within Tualatin's floodways and floodplains.

Financing for Downtown Urban Renewal Agency was established while Yvonne served as City Administrator including an Urban Renewal Agency in the downtown area to eliminate blighted areas and fund public facilities such as streets, parking lots, park lands and open spaces which later resulted in development of the Lake of the Commons, many new businesses, and a new major by-pass now called Tualatin-Sherwood Road. The majority of the facilities were financed by new development and the incremental taxes produced by the new development, plus federal and state grants while Yvonne served as City Administrator.

Financing and Acquiring Open Spaces, Parks, Greenways, Natural Areas, Trails, and Recreational Facilities was one of Yvonne's significant accomplishments using federal and state grants, voter approved measures, including urban renewal tax increment financing and business donations. Yvonne led acquisition of lands for major public facilities including the second city hall, where the present library stands, Operations Center/public works shops, portions of Tualatin Community Park including the Tualatin/Durham Senior Center (now Juanita Pohl Center) land and development, Lafky House, Van Raden Community Center, park lands for tennis courts, park administration offices, parking lots, land north of the railroad trestle, and Tualatin River waterfront lands on north side of the river between Boones Ferry Road and just north of the trestle.

Yvonne managed the dedication, donation, and development of many parks, greenways, natural areas, and trails including Lafky Park, Little Wood Rose Nature Park, Saarinen Wayside Park, the north and east portions of Tualatin Community Park from the railroad trestle to Ki-a-Kuts Bike and Pedestrian Bridge and the land on which the Lafky House and the Juanita Pohl Center sit; trails in subdivisions including Shaniko, Chieftain, Dakota Hills, Hedges Creek, Indian Woods, Autumn Woods, Columbia, Hi-West Estates (Lafky Park), Sandhurst, and several major right of way improvements, including street trees.

Jobs and Economic Development, while not contributions to the park and recreation system were major accomplishments of the City Council while Yvonne served as City Administrator, including recruitment of Meridian Park Hospital. When development started there were only three major employers: Hervin Company employed 125 people;

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Ramada/Sweetbrier Inn employed 120 people, and Peerless Truck and Trailer Service employed 200. Recruitment of Meridian Park Hospital was the first major business development accomplishment of the Mayor and Yvonne as City Administrator. The Hospital today is the largest employer of 800 people and has spurred location of many more professional and medical facilities and jobs in Tualatin.

Recent Volunteer Work by Yvonne, after retirement from state service, has included participation with the following projects for her hometown:

- Board member and former president of Tualatin Historical Society with a key accomplishment of assisting with the relocation and rehabilitation of the old Tualatin Methodist Church into the Tualatin Heritage Center in cooperation with the City of Tualatin.
- Obtaining a Washington County Visitor's Association grant which led to development of the Tualatin Ice Age Visitor's Plan by a national branding expert and interpretive projects of the unique Ice Age Floods and Ancient Animals that lived in the area over 10,000 years ago. She has created partnerships with businesses, the City, County, Metro, Chamber of Commerce, and other organizations including the Ice Age Floods Institute, Lower Columbia Chapter, North America Research Group, Willamette Valley Pleistocene Project, University of Oregon, and Portland State University.
- Facilitating CenterCal's interest in using the Ice Age as a theme in the Nyberg Rivers Shopping Center including creating the bronze statue of a baby mastodon and boy inspired by the original digging of mastodon bones in the Tualatin swamps, providing a children's book about the mastodon, Cabela's Ice Cave, and encouraging partnership with the City in building a new section of the Tualatin River Greenway Trail.
- Yvonne will always be linked to the Tualatin Mastodon now displayed at the Tualatin Public Library in that she personally typed the original report on the excavation of the bones in 1962 and, later, she facilitated the return of the mastodon bones to Tualatin from the Portland Zoo where they were in storage. She has continued her interest in displaying megafauna found in the Tualatin area including bones from other large ancient animals that lived here: a mammoth, ground sloth, mastodon and bison.
- Serving on the Washington County Museum board which approved expansion of cultural facilities at the Hillsboro Civic Center. She currently serves as a board member of the Willamette Falls Heritage Area Coalition which recently obtained approval from the State Heritage Council for the first State Heritage Area. She is now working on Federal Designation and recently facilitated Oregon Senate passage of a Memorial requesting Congress to create the federal heritage area (which includes West Linn, Oregon City, parts of Lake Oswego and the mouth of the Tualatin River), and to re-open the Willamette Falls locks for recreation and business, as well as to appropriate funds for repair and operation of the locks.

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Awards Yvonne has received include the Chamber of Commerce “Spirit of Tualatin” award and the Tualatin Historical Society Lafky-Martinazzi Award for extraordinary dedication to preserving Tualatin’s Ice Age History.

The City is developing a new section of the Tualatin River Greenway Trail to provide people access to nature, promote public health, provide a safe off-street transportation alternative, and for the general recreational benefit and enjoyment of the people that will include a beautiful and peaceful overlook along the Tualatin River that would serve as an appropriate place to name “Yvonne Addington Overlook” (see Attachment C).

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS:

There will be a cost to place signage at the Yvonne Addington Overlook that can be afforded as part of the current Tualatin River Greenway Gap Completion Project.

PUBLIC INVOLVEMENT:

The Tualatin Park Advisory Committee (TPARK) and Tualatin City Council meetings when this subject is considered serve as the public involvement opportunities for this recommendation. These meetings are posted on the City’s website.

Chapter 05-06: Memorials and Naming Policy**Sections:**5-6-005 Purpose.5-6-010 Definitions.5-6-020 Process; Exemption.5-6-030 Naming of City Park Properties, Amenities or Facilities.5-6-040 Deviations from Policy.5-6-005 Purpose.

The purpose of this policy is to describe conditions and establish criteria for placement of memorials on City park property, and naming of public park facilities. [Ord. 1189-05, 5/23/05]

5-6-010 Definitions.

- (1) "City Property" means a parcel of land or improvement owned and operated by the City of Tualatin for public purposes.
 - (2) "Park" means a parcel of land owned and operated by the City of Tualatin for park and recreation purposes.
 - (3) "Facility" means a building or structure located on a City property, including but not limited to libraries, office buildings, utility buildings, recreation centers, community centers, plazas, pathways, sports fields or structures used for specific sports such as tennis courts, basketball courts, and skate parks.
 - (4) "Amenity" means a smaller support structure located within a larger City park facility, such as benches, picnic tables, conference rooms, playgrounds, drinking fountains, decorative or water play fountains, gardens, gazebos or vegetation.
 - (5) "Memorial" means a facility or amenity placed within a City park facility or on City park property in remembrance of a particular person or event. For the purposes of this policy, "memorials" also include features designated for purposes such as celebrations, or other special recognition. Memorials are divided into two categories:
 - (a) "Minor Memorial" means an amenity or facility proposed for use as a memorial with a value of less than \$5,000.
 - (b) "Major Memorial" means an amenity or facility proposed for use as a memorial with a value of more than \$5,000.
- The value of a memorial will be determined based on the costs attributable to the project per TMC 5-6-020(4)(a).
- (6) "Resident" means a person residing or owning land within the Tualatin city limits, or a business located within the Tualatin city limits.
 - (7) "Plaque" means a marker used to identify an amenity or facility as a memorial. [Ord. 1189-05, 5/23/05]

5-6-020 Process; Exemption.

- (1) The Tualatin Commons is specifically exempted from this policy.

Chapter 05-06: Memorials and Naming Policy

(2) All requests to place memorials on City property shall be submitted in writing to the Community Services Director. Major memorial requests may be made after a two-year waiting period following an event, activity or occurrence that has generated the desire to create a memorial.

(3) Requests shall be evaluated as follows:

(a) Minor Memorials. The Community Services Director shall decide whether to approve or deny any minor memorial request in consultation with other City staff or individuals, as necessary.

(b) Major Memorials. Staff shall make a recommendation to the Tualatin Park Advisory Committee (TPARK), who shall review all major memorial requests. TPARK will forward a recommendation to the City Council for approval, or issue a denial, which can be appealed to the City Council. The decision of the City Council is final.

(4) The criteria to be used to evaluate a minor or major memorial request shall include, but not be limited to, the following:

(a) Whether the request for memorial includes the direct cost of the amenity or facility including design, purchase of the amenity or facility, installation, and whether any special maintenance requirements are being borne by the requesting party. Staff time to coordinate the memorial and minor levels of effort to assist with design and installation may be borne by the City.

(b) Whether the memorial will interfere with the existing or planned design, function or intended user experience of the area in which it is to be located.

(c) Whether the placement of the memorial will create a condition in which a significant number of amenities or facilities within a City facility or park are used for memorial purposes. The intent is to assure that placement of memorials will not detract from the overall design, intended experience, vision or appeal of any park facility or property.

(d) Whether the placement of the memorial is proposed to replace a facility or amenity currently serving as a memorial for another purpose. Only under extremely rare and unusual circumstances shall existing memorials be replaced by another memorial.

(e) Whether the design of the memorial makes use of equipment, structures, vegetation, or features that are of similar quality and design to existing or planned standards for amenities or facilities within the City.

(f) Whether any identifying plaque associated with the memorial is constructed of heavy duty, high quality bronze material, and no more than 5" x 7" in size.

(g) Whether the placement of the memorial will create an increased maintenance or long-term replacement burden.

(h) Whether the installation or construction of the memorial will be completed or overseen by trained individuals in consultation with City staff, in accordance with all applicable master plans, codes, rules and regulations at the local, state and federal level.

(i) Whether the requesting party agrees and understands that all memorials become the property of the City, and the City shall not be required to replace any memorial or portion of a memorial that is vandalized, damaged or stolen. The requesting party must also agree that the memorial may be removed, at the City's sole discretion, if the Community Services Director finds the removal to be in the public's best interest. [Ord. 1189-05, 5/23/05]

5-6-030 Naming of City Park Properties, Amenities or Facilities.

(1) Consideration of the following in naming city park properties, amenities or facilities is strongly encouraged:

(a) Historical significance;

(b) Geographical identifiers; and

(c) Natural characteristics, including flora and fauna that are characteristic of the Tualatin area.

(2) All requests to name or re-name a City park property, amenity or facility shall be made in writing to the Community Services Director. Such requests may be submitted after a two-year waiting period following an event, activity or occurrence that has generated the desire to name a City property, park, amenity or facility.

(3) Requests to name or rename a City park property, amenity or facility shall be evaluated by TPARK, along with a staff recommendation. TPARK shall make a recommendation to the City Council for approval of the name. A denial by TPARK may be appealed to the City Council. The decision of the City Council is final.

(4) Generally, the naming of a City park property, amenity or facility shall occur before or during development, and be the product of a public participation process.

(5) For purposes of evaluation and recommendation, the naming of a City park property, amenity or facility shall be divided into two categories:

(a) Service and Non-monetary Contribution. A City park property, amenity or facility may be named to honor a person, living or deceased, in recognition of that person's extraordinary volunteerism, employment, leadership or similar service or non-monetary contributions to the mission and purpose of parks and recreation in the City of Tualatin. The applicant should submit a letter providing a summary and examples of the significant contributions to the mission and purpose of parks and recreation in Tualatin, with supporting documentation such as newspaper clippings, letters of support, or other relevant information.

(b) Financial Contributions. TPARK may consider naming a city park property, amenity or facility for a resident, Tualatin organization or business that has given or offered to give an appropriate and significant financial contribution to acquire, construct or otherwise enhance a park and recreation facility. A significant contribution means a donation of at least 51% (or \$300,000, whichever is greater) of the cost of the acquisition, construction or improvement of the City property, park, amenity or facility requested for naming.

(6) Renaming of City Park Properties, Facilities or Amenities. The City of Tualatin intends that the name on a facility be the permanent designation. Only under extreme or extraordinary circumstances shall facilities be renamed.

(7) An application to rename a facility shall comply with and be evaluated in accordance with the procedures set out in TMC 5-6-020. [Ord. 1189-05, 5/23/05]


5-6-040 Deviations from Policy.

The Community Services Director may allow minor deviations from this ordinance if he or she finds that such deviation will further the goals and intent of this ordinance and will help further the mission of parks and recreation in the Tualatin community. [Ord. 1189-05, 5/23/05]




