A. CALL TO ORDER

Chair Buck Braden called the meeting to order at 6:30 pm.

B. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

It was MOVED by Mason Hall and SECONDED by Kristin Erickson to approve the minutes of August 18, 2015.

C. <u>NEW BUSINESS</u>

[Chair Buck Braden moved Item E.1. Library Manager Jerianne Thompson presented information about the Washington County Cooperative Library levy coming up in November and described services available at Tualatin Public Library. She described the many programs available for children, teens and adults.

D. COMMUNICATIONS

1. Chair

Buck Braden stated that he will miss the October meeting for a maritime art show.

2. Council Liaison

Councilor Bubenik stated that he has endorsed a yes vote on the Washington County Cooperative Library levy and encouraged all to vote. He also gave updates on the Basalt Creek planning process, the City facilities study and Tualatin's progress in the America's Best Communities (ABC) contest.

3. Staff

Kelsey Lewis asked for volunteers to help with the annual Trail Count event in late September. Regarding the Visual Chronicle suspension that was voted on at the last meeting, she stated that Paul Hennon had some other ideas about moving forward and there would be more on that soon. Lastly she described the proposal staff recently made to the Washington County Visitor's Association for ArtWalk upgrades.

4. Public

E. OLD BUSINESS

1. Community Enhancement Award

[Member Mason Hall removed himself from discussion and voting for this item due to his association with Mask & Mirror.]

Committee members discussed Mask & Mirror Community Theatre's production of Singin' in the Rain in August. Chair Braden stated that the group is approaching the level of a professional group like Broadway Rose which is impressive for all volunteer organization. Members Kristen Erickson and Brett Hamilton noted that they had not been able to see the play, but heard it went well. Members Art Barry, Dawn Upton, Buck Braden and Councilor Frank Bubenik agreed that the play was excellent and well attended.

It was MOVED by Kristin Erickson and SECONDED by Dawn Upton to recommend to City Council that Mask & Mirror Community Theatre be awarded the Community Enhancement Award for its production of Singin' in the Rain. The vote was unanimous.

2. 2015-16 Student Visual Chronicle

Kelsey Lewis reviewed the proposed schedule for this year's Student Visual Chronicle and asked for discussion of whether the group would like to establish a theme in addition to providing a representation of Tualatin. Members discussed and determined that TAAC should be neutral, letting the artists decide, but that they would like to see Tualatin from their perspective as young people. Kelsey Lewis and TAAC members discussed the possibility of partnering with Tualatin High School on a diversity project if there is a grant opportunity, but otherwise staff will move forward with coordinating the Student Visual Chronicle as usual.

3. Tualatin River Greenway Trail Project

Kelsey Lewis gave an update on the trail project. She showed the Committee pictures of the concrete and bronze fossil castings of Ice Age animals will be placed along the trail. She described progress on other elements of the project.

F. COMMUNICATIONS FROM COMMITTEE MEMBERS

Member Dawn Upton described the Forest Grove Sidewalk Art Show and explained that it is very popular. She mentioned Oktoberfest coming up in Mt. Angel, Oregon.

Chair Buck Braden stated that he viewed an exhibit about World War II at the Oregon Historical Society and encouraged other to see it.

Mason Hall stated that the Singin' in the Rain play production was close to breaking even at around \$20,000, which is a great accomplishment for the first major production by Mask & Mirror. He noted a lot of support from the community and stated that Mask & Mirror will consider another big production in the future.



ISSUE BEFORE THE COUNCIL:

Council consideration of adopting an Outdoor Smoke and Tobacco Free City Spaces Policy for property owned and/or managed by the City.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

This initiative is to consider Council adopting an Outdoor Smoke and Tobacco Free City Spaces Policy for property owned and/or managed by the City. At the Council work session on July 28, 2014, Tualatin Together presented information to Council with a proposal to restrict smoking and tobacco in parks and other properties owned and/or managed by the City. The Council requested additional information be brought back at a future work session for further review and discussion.

There is an established trend among federal, state, and municipal agencies and jurisdictions, as well as private business and nonprofit organizations, to regulate smoking and tobacco use in outdoor spaces to promote public health and wellness, reduce operating costs, and for other reasons.

Support for this kind of policy can be found in the City Council 2020 Vision, Community Services Department mission and goals, Tualatin Tomorrow goals, Public Health vision, mission and goals, and health care provider initiatives. The Tualatin Library Advisory Committee and Tualatin Park Advisory Committee have recommended the Council consider smoke and tobacco free outdoor City areas.

Currently, the Tualatin Municipal Code, Chapter 06-07: Tobacco Use in Public Places, does not address outdoor smoking in parks or City owned or managed property, except as it relates to near the entrance of an enclosed area (near the doors of a building).

DISCUSSION:

Key policy questions for Council consideration include:

- Should smoke free policy include all tobacco and inhalant delivery systems (vapor)?
- Should tobacco free policy include all smoking and chewing items, methods, products and devices?
- Should regulation focus on consumption or use and not possession?

Not included in the scope or consideration:

- Retail sales and/or advertising or display of smoking and tobacco products
- Hookah establishments
- Smoking or tobacco use inside buildings

Where should smoke and tobacco products be regulated?

- Option: All Outdoor property owned or managed by City Includes all parklands, Library plaza, City offices, Tualatin Commons, property surrounding the Police Department, Operations building, and core area parking lots.
- Option: Selected Locations, but not all sites
 Could include any mix of parklands (parks, natural areas, trails, greenways), Tualatin
 Commons, Library Plaza, Police Department, Operations Department, City Parking Lots (core area)

Purpose and Reasons for Policy

The purpose and reasons for implementing a smoke and tobacco free outdoor city space policy include:

- Reduction of maintenance (litter)
- Fire safety
- Public health and wellness (second hand smoke)
- Community image and perception (social norms for youth)
- Environmental harm (wildlife)
- Consistency in policy from the federal, state, county, and municipal levels of government

Key Considerations

Key considerations for Council review and policy direction regarding an Outdoor Smoke and Tobacco Free City Spaces Policy include:

- Reason and Purpose
- Locations Included
- Implementation Schedule
- Public Involvement
- Constraints and Opposition
- Opportunities and Support
- Penalties and Enforcement

Financial Implications:

Financial implications would include the cost of refreshing signage for parklands and other property owned or managed by the City and public information materials. An estimate of these costs will be completed, if Council chooses to move forward with a Outdoor Smoke and Tobacco Free City Spaces Policy.

Next Steps

The next steps to implement such a policy are: 1) public information and public involvement, followed by 2) preparation of a draft ordinance for Council consideration and direction. Then, 3)

Council adoption of an ordinance, and 4) implementation over a designated period of time.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends Council review and consider aspects to include or not include in an Outdoor Smoke and Tobacco Free City Spaces Policy for property owned and/or managed by the City, and provide direction for next steps.



Key Issues

Scope (What's Included)



SUBJECT: Tualatin River Greenway Trail Project Update

ISSUE BEFORE THE COUNCIL:

The staff will present an update on the construction of the Tualatin River Greenway Gap Trail Completion Project, including a discussion of the scope, schedule, budget and related issues.

The Tualatin River Greenway Gap Completion Project will provide a new bicycle and pedestrian trail connecting people with nature while enabling easy and safe exercise, recreation and wildlife viewing, and commuting between residential and commercial areas and public facilities.

The new segment of trail will be located between the new Barngrover Street (near the Tualatin Public Library) and the existing Tualatin River Greenway path located north of Nyberg Lane (between the old RV of Portland site and the Stone's Throw Apartments). The trail will provide a safe and convenient bicycle and pedestrian alternative to crossing Interstate 5 at the Nyberg Street overpass.


There will be connections to adjoining residential and commercial developments, river overlooks, nature and cultural interpretive elements, and benches spread throughout the project.

The new trail will be about three quarters of a mile in length with an undercrossing of Interstate 5 at the Tualatin River. The trail will vary from 10 to 16 feet wide and be constructed of a mix of concrete and boardwalk with a plastic lumber deck.

The project is on schedule and project costs are within available funding. A grant from the Washington County Visitors Association in the amount of \$50,000 has been received to assist with the cost of nature and cultural interpretive elements that will be integrated into the trail.

The trail is now under construction and is about 70 percent complete. The trail will be finished and open for public use in the Winter of 2016. Grand opening activities are being planned for the month of April with a ribbon cutting ceremony scheduled for April 9, 2016.
