

Records Division

The Records Division provides essential assistance to Tualatin officers, administration, other criminal justice agencies and the citizens of Tualatin. The members of the Records Division take great pride in providing excellent customer service while offering assistance with accurate and up-to-date crime data information.

2015 marked a unique change in our records management system. The reporting software changed to a new regionally consistent software called Regional Joint Information Network (RegJIN). This is used by approximately 50 agencies and over five counties in Oregon and Washington.





Police Services Technicians are responsible for all aspects of document control, to include copying, distribution, data entry and filing of police reports, records, and citations.


Criminal citations entered in 2015



Traffic citations entered in 2015






TOTAL POLICE ACTIVITY



This graph represents all police activity in Tualatin and Durham, including calls from the public and self-initiated activities.



2015 ARRESTS, USE OF FORCE INCIDENTS & COMPLAINTS




Traffic Division

The traffic team is responsible for enforcing traffic laws, educating the public, investigating crashes, and evaluating the intersection safety camera citations for final approval.




Traffic Crashes in 2015

Intersection Safety Cameras

Intersection safety camera enforcement has shown to be a more effective and safe method of decreasing red light violations. Statistics have shown a decrease in red light violations and a significant decrease in injury crashes resulting from drivers running red lights when these cameras are installed.

The City of Tualatin began utilizing intersection safety cameras, also known as photo red light camera enforcement, in December 2010. The objective of the intersection safety cameras was to reduce traffic crashes at intersections, reduce the number of red light violations, change the behavior of drivers who travel through the City of Tualatin, reduce traffic congestion, and improve officer safety.

Tualatin currently has two operational safety camera intersections. They are located at SW Tualatin-Sherwood Road at Avery Street and at SW Lower Boones Ferry Road at Bridgeport Road/72nd Street.

When a violation occurs and a camera image is captured, a citation is not automatically generated. An initial screening of the camera image is done by the intersection safety camera system company, Redflex Traffic Systems. If they feel a violation has potentially occurred, the image is sent to our department for an officer to review to determine if an actual violation has occurred. Our officer makes the final decision on whether a citation is issued and mailed to the registered owner.




The pie charts to the right represent a breakdown of citations issued in each intersection with an intersection safety camera. They are categorized by zip code regions.

The Tualatin Police Department noticed an immediate decline in the number of crashes, red light violations, and number of citations issued at both intersections since the systems became functional. This decrease is an indication that the systems have had a positive effect on driver behavior and traffic safety in our city.


The pie graph below for the SW Lower Boones Ferry Road at Brideport/72nd Street location shows that 8% of the citations that were issued actually went to drivers with a Tualatin address, 13% to addresses out of the state of Oregon, and 79% to addresses outside the Tualatin area. The next pie graph for the SW Tualatin-Sherwood Road at Avery Street location shows that 13% of the citations that were issued went to drivers with a Tualatin address, 12% to addresses out of the state of Oregon, and 75% to addresses out of the Tualatin area.

SW Lower Boones Ferry Road at Brideport/72nd Street




■ Tualatin Addresses ■ Other Oregon Addresses ■ Out of State Addresses

SW Tualatin-Sherwood Road at Avery Street









TOTAL PROPERTY & EVIDENCE ITEMS






K-9 Zoey

Drug Detection Canine

Zoey was assigned to Officer Nick Barkley for the majority of 2015, until Officer Eric French took over as her new handler in November, where he finished out the remainder of the year in training with Zoey to become a certified drug detection team.

Zoey began her time with the Tualatin Police Department as a two year old Chocolate Lab, trained in narcotics detection. Officer Nick Barkley was assigned as her handler at that time. Officer Barkley changed professions, which left Zoey without a handler for two months. In November 2015, Officer Eric French was assigned as her new handler. Officer French went through training and certification and was officially patrol ready with Zoey approximately two months later.

Zoey is used solely as a detection canine during drug investigations or incidents where there is suspicion of drug possession. She is also used for public relations events and school walk-throughs. Zoey and her handler are on-call to assist all patrol shifts in Tualatin, as well as other neighboring police agencies. Zoey is certified through the Oregon Police Canine Association.

In 2015, Zoey and Officer Barkley were deployed 20 times, for five different agencies. These deployments led to seven administrative actions at Tualatin High School and four unrelated felony arrests.

Officer Barkley also conducted numerous public demonstrations throughout the year.

Investigations

In 2015 detectives investigated several assaults, burglaries, armed robberies, sex crimes and child abuse allegations. Tualatin Police Detectives participate in several multi-agency teams, including: Clackamas County Major Crimes Team, Washington County Major Crime Team and Tactical Negotiations Team, Elder Safe Team, Sex Abuse Response Team, Child Abuse Multi-Disciplinary Team and Metal Theft Task Force.


Our detectives helped investigate five Washington County murder cases and two officer involved shootings. These types of cases involve extensive, time consuming investigation, documentation and generation of reports. Our Detectives also provided training to our department members and surrounding agencies in areas such as Taser, legal update, active threat and other scenarios. They participated in the fifth annual Tualatin Citizen's Academy, attended the Oregon Homicide Investigators' Association Major Crimes Conference, and gave school and local business security presentations.

School Resource Officers

During the school year the School Resource Officers (SROs) make it a priority to provide a secure environment for the staff and students in the various Tualatin schools to help promote a safe educational atmosphere. They conduct classroom presentations that focus on laws, gang resistance education, and familiarization with the juvenile justice system. When necessary, they enforce local and state laws within schools to create a safe and secure place for students to learn and thrive. SROs provide anti-gang education and devote their summers to the G.R.E.A.T. Summer Program, giving students the opportunity to attend a positive, educationally focused summer camp at minimal cost.




Community Services Officer



Citizen's Academy

Each year the Tualatin Police Department holds a citizen's academy titled "The Tualatin Police Experience".

This event gives members of our city the opportunity to take an in-depth tour of our facility, learn the functions of the various divisions of the police department, take part in defensive tactics exercises and confrontational scenarios, learn emergency vehicle driving, and safely shoot firearms. It is our way of sharing a small percentage of what it's like to be an officer and what our department does each day to stay safe and protect others. This enables the participants to walk away with a far better understanding of what police do and why.

The Tualatin Police Experience has proven to be a very educational event. Each time all of the participants have provided valuable feedback. Many of them have said the experience will forever change the way they look at police related situations in the future, and they have greatly benefited from the training.



There are 12 participants that attend each annually held class, which consist of business people, residents, and members of Tualatin's Community Involvement Organizations (CIOs).



National Night Out

The first Tuesday of every August is National Night Out. This is the time where residents in neighborhoods throughout Tualatin and across the nation are asked to lock their doors, turn on outside lights and spend the evening outdoors with neighbors, family, friends, and police, giving crime and drugs a going away party. Many citizens host a variety of events such as block parties, cookouts, parades, contests, youth activities and small concerts. Tualatin police officers love to attend these events and mingle with the community. This is all done in the spirit of getting to know neighbors and local police in order to prevent crime in the community and build alliances against criminal activity in the City of Tualatin. In 2015, Tualatin celebrated with nearly 15 events throughout the community, with approximately 1,000 residents.




Torch Run & Polar Plunge


