

PATROL DIVISION



The Patrol Division remains the backbone of the department, responding to emergencies, conducting proactive enforcement, and maintaining visible presence throughout the community.

CALLS FOR SERVICE

In 2025, officers responded to 25,439 total calls for service, including both dispatched calls and officer-initiated activity.

ARREST ACTIVITY

Officers made 781 total arrests, including:

- **713 Adult Arrests**
- **68 Juvenile Arrests**

REPORTS

Officers generated:

- **3,140 Offense/Incident Reports**
- **20 Missing Person Reports**
- **16 Field Contacts**
- **284 Accident Reports**

Proactive engagement remained strong, with over 12,000 self-initiated activities demonstrating continued commitment to crime prevention and traffic safety.

TRAFFIC DIVISION



The Traffic Division focuses on crash reduction, education, and targeted enforcement to improve roadway safety.

CRASH DATA

312 crash reports were taken, including:

- 130 Property Damage Crashes
- 83 Injury Crashes
- 99 Hit & Run Reports

When including all agency responses, officers responded to 700 total traffic-related incidents, including 237 hit-and-run calls for service.

ENFORCEMENT ACTIVITY

Officers issued:

- **2,539 Traffic Violations**
- **362 Criminal Citations**
- **3,558 Warnings Issued**

TRAFFIC TEAM ACTIVITY

Traffic Officers conducted:

- **1,218 Violations**
- **17 Criminal Charges**
- **1,242 Warnings**
- **2,477 Total Enforcement Contacts**

The Traffic Team conducted 2,477 total enforcement contacts, reinforcing safe driving practices throughout Tualatin and Durham.

DURHAM CONTRACT SERVICES



Through our contract with the City of Durham, Tualatin Police provided:

- **409 Dispatched Calls**
- **205 Self-Initiated Calls**
- **103 Violation Stops**
- **16 Arrests**

We remain committed to delivering the same high standard of service to our Durham partners.

INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION



Detectives investigated 262 assigned cases in 2025.

Detectives continue working closely with regional task forces and community partners to ensure thorough investigations and victim-centered responses.

PROPERTY & EVIDENCE



The Property & Evidence Division plays a critical role in maintaining the integrity of criminal investigations by ensuring that all evidence and recovered property are properly documented, stored, and preserved. Careful evidence management supports successful investigations and prosecutions while maintaining accountability and transparency.

2025 ACTIVITY

- **7,797 Items Logged** (including body-worn camera evidence)
- **1,676 Items Disposed Of**, including:
 - 1,577 Mark43 Property System Dispositions
 - 99 Prior-System Dispositions

In 2025, the unit logged 7,797 items into the property system, including physical evidence collected during investigations and digital evidence such as body-worn camera recordings. Each item is tracked through a secure chain of custody from collection through final disposition.

The division also processed the lawful disposal of 1,676 items, including property returned to rightful owners, evidence destroyed in accordance with court orders, or items otherwise cleared for release.

EVIDENCE INTEGRITY & COMPLIANCE

The unit maintains strict chain-of-custody procedures and compliance with Oregon State Crime Lab standards.

RECORDS DIVISION



SUPPORTING DEPARTMENT OPERATIONS

The Records Division supports daily police operations by managing reports, maintaining accurate data, and ensuring timely access to information for officers, prosecutors, and the public. Accurate documentation and data management help ensure transparency, accountability, and effective case management.

FRONT COUNTER SERVICES

Police Services Technicians are often the **first point of contact** for community members visiting the police department. In addition to assisting the public at the front counter, they perform several key administrative functions that keep the department running smoothly, including:

- Reviewing and processing police reports for accuracy and completeness
- Coordinating officer court appearances
- Processing records requests and background checks
- Completing vehicle releases for community members

STAFFING

The Records Division is staffed by **three full-time Police Services Technicians**, who work under the supervision of the Police Services Supervisor. Through careful attention to detail, strong customer service, and a commitment to accuracy, the division provides essential administrative support that allows sworn personnel to focus on serving and protecting the community.

K9 PROGRAM



EXPANDING PUBLIC SAFETY CAPABILITIES

The Tualatin Police Department's K9 Program enhances public safety through narcotics detection, suspect apprehension, tracking, and community engagement.

In 2025, the department welcomed its first patrol canine, Boone, strengthening field operations and officer safety through tracking and suspect apprehension capabilities. The department also welcomed a new narcotics detection canine, Drea.

The program also includes K9 Onyx, the department's wellness and therapy dog, who supports employee wellness, victim response, and community outreach efforts.

K9 BOONE

K9 Boone and his handler support patrol operations by locating fleeing suspects, tracking individuals who have left crime scenes, and assisting during high-risk incidents. Boone also regularly supports neighboring agencies when specialized K9 resources are needed.

K9 Boone's 2025 activity included:

- **65 Deployments and K9 Requests**
- **13 Tracks Conducted** - resulting in **6 arrests or suspect surrenders**
- **29 Total Arrests and Surrenders** - during K9 deployments
- **10+ Outside Agencies Assisted**

Boone's work in his first year significantly enhanced the department's ability to safely locate suspects and support regional law enforcement partners.

K9 TONY - RETIREMENT & 2025 IMPACT

On **July 10, 2025**, K9 Tony retired after years of dedicated service as the department's narcotics detection canine.

Prior to his retirement, Tony located and assisted in the seizure of:

- **22 pounds of Methamphetamine**
- **9.2 pounds of Fentanyl**
- **2.4 pounds of Cocaine**
- **8.7 ounces of Heroin**
- **6 Firearms**

Tony's work removed significant quantities of dangerous narcotics and illegal weapons from the community. His service made a lasting impact on public safety in Tualatin and surrounding areas.



K9 DREA - SINCE AUGUST 1, 2025

- **272.6 pounds of Methamphetamine**
- **19 pounds of Fentanyl**
- **5 pounds of Cocaine**
- **5.4 ounces of Heroin**
- **2 Firearms**

Drea's early contributions reflect the continued strength and effectiveness of the department's narcotics K9 program.

PUBLIC SAFETY CAPABILITIES

The K9 Program represents the department's ongoing investment in specialized training, proactive enforcement, and innovative tools that enhance community safety.

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS



Our School Resource Officers continue to provide a safe educational environment in partnership with the Tigard-Tualatin School District.

SRO responsibilities include:

- **Campus safety and security**
- **Juvenile investigations**
- **DHS-related cases**
- **Classroom presentations**
- **Youth engagement and mentorship**

SROs also support summer youth programming and community education initiatives.

H.E.R.O.E.S. SUMMER CAMP

The Tualatin Police Department's **H.E.R.O.E.S. Summer Camp** (Helping Educate Responsible Outstanding Everyday Students) is a summer program for students entering **6th through 9th grades**. Led by School Resource Officers, the camp combines educational lessons and activities that reinforce the Tigard-Tualatin School District's core values: **Be Respectful, Responsible, Safe, and Kind**.

Students participate in discussions on decision-making, healthy relationships, and the impacts of crime, while also enjoying team-building activities and group field trips.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT



The department remains actively engaged in community outreach efforts, including:

- **National Night Out**
- **Viva Tualatin**
- **Shop With a Cop**
- **Blender Dash**
- **Westcoast Giant Pumpkin Regatta**

Officers continue to emphasize relationship-building, transparency, and accessibility.

TRAINING & PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT



In 2025:

- All supervisory staff completed **Trauma-Informed Response Training**
- Ongoing advanced training was conducted across patrol, investigations, and specialized units

Professional development remains a priority to ensure high-quality service delivery.

UAS PROGRAM



2025 BY THE NUMBERS

The Tualatin Police Department utilizes Unmanned Aerial Systems (UAS), or drones, to support public safety operations. Drones provide real-time aerial information during emergencies and investigations, improving situational awareness while reducing risk to officers and the community.

TECHNOLOGY ENHANCING PUBLIC SAFETY

- **60+ Deployments** in Tualatin and surrounding cities
- **16 Suspects Captured** directly assisted or located by drone operations
- **4 FAA Part 107-Certified Pilots**
- **2 Advanced Drone Platforms** (DJI Matrice 30T & DJI Avata 2)

OPERATIONAL USES

Drones were deployed in:

- **SWAT standoffs**
- **Search and rescue operations**
- **Crash and crime scene investigations**
- **Building searches**
- **Locating fleeing suspects**
- **Locating a subject in crisis who had attempted suicide with a firearm**

These deployments provided critical intelligence before officers entered potentially dangerous environments.
