Recycling is important

Reduce costs. By separating out reusable and recyclable materials, you may be able to save money by reducing your garbage service.

Create jobs. Recycling services create jobs with businesses that haul, process and sell recovered materials, as well as with companies that manufacture and distribute products made with these recycled materials. Recycling in our state creates nearly \$1.55 billion in economic benefits for Oregonians.

Keep the community clean. Recycling reduces the amount of waste sent to landfills and reduces greenhouse gas emissions. Manufacturers can use more recycled materials to create new products instead of raw materials, which reduces air, water and land pollution.


Protect the environment. Recycling conserves energy and the natural resources such as trees, water and minerals that are used to make new goods.

Reduce, reuse and repair

Making a new product requires a lot of resources and energy — taking raw materials from the earth, processing them, making a product and transporting it to be sold. Reducing what you buy new and reusing and repairing what you have helps protect the environment and save money. Here are some ideas:

- Buy used. Find great deals on everything from clothes to building materials.
- Buy in bulk and use refillable containers when possible.
- Try reusable over disposable items. Start small by bringing your own water bottle or coffee mug and refusing items like straws or napkins if you don't need them.
- Maintain and repair products like clothing, furniture and appliances. Check out repairfair.org for upcoming opportunities to repair items.





Did you know that 40% of food in the U.S. is wasted? Almost half of that waste comes from households. **The average family of four throws out about \$1,500 worth of food every year!** By making small changes in how we shop for, prepare and store food, we can waste less, save money and conserve the valuable resources that go into producing food. Start by labelling a bin in your fridge with an "Eat this First" sticker (we can send you one!).

Recycle at Drop-off Locations

What to recycle and where?

You can recycle some items that don't go into your recycling roll cart by taking them to a drop-off recycling center. Items include batteries, Styrofoam, electronics, medications, paint, plastic bags, shoes and clothing, and more.
