1. CALL TO ORDER

Chair Bartholomew called the meeting to order at 6:35 pm.

 Aquilla distributed the Tualatin Housing Inventory document (attached); the committee had a robust discussion about the document.
 - ii. What actions are currently underway?

 Aquilla discussed the Accessory Dwelling Unit (ADU) code changes that are currently underway which would allow detached ADUs and create clear and objective standards. Committee member Bachhuber read a statement that he had developed for the Planning Commission when they looked at ADUs. He also described the survey he did of the number of homes that would be able to actually have an ADU. He advocated for a policy of allowing, facilitating, and advocating for ADUs. The committee discussed the need for affordable housing in relation to the apartment complexes that are being built. There was some discussion about what other cities are doing. Committee member Reyes discussed the value of home ownership, specifically the ability for it to lift people out of poverty and change people's lives.
 - iii. Are there any plans to address housing policy in the future?

 The committee discussed and agreed that this should become a priority for the City and that there needs to be an actual housing plan. The Chamber is also interested in this as well, especially how in how it relates to workforce housing. The committee encouraged Committee member Reyes to document her story because it's compelling. The committee agreed that there is a need for more affordable housing options.



Update to the Tualatin Tomorrow Advisory Committee

June 6, 2018

Create and implement an actionable city center plan

STATUS: Not started

SPECIFIC ACCOMPLISHMENTS: This action could be identified as a priority in Phase II of the Tualatin Development Code Improvement Project when broader policy actions are identified.

Strengthen guidelines that preserve open space and natural areas as the City grows and expands; Maintain vegetative buffers between cities and planning subareas; promote mixed use that offers amenities rather than housing-only

STATUS: *Underway*

SPECIFIC ACCOMPLISHMENTS: The Basalt Creek Concept Plan will address protection of environmental space.

MILESTONES: Public Hearing July 23, 2018

Facilitate local access to fresh foods through zoning and regulatory code amendments; Develop food cart policy, regulations that allow local food to be sold in public areas

STATUS: Complete

SPECIFIC ACCOMPLISHMENTS: A food cart ordinance was adopted by City Council and becomes effective January 2019

Continue to create distinct retail activity centers throughout the City; Look to Metro preference survey to ID future priorities; expand Industrial/Business Park overlays to residential areas where appropriate

STATUS: *Ongoing*

SPECIFIC ACCOMPLISHMENTS: This action could emerge as a focus in Phase II of the Tualatin Development Code Improvement Project when broader policy actions are identified.

Facilitate the creation of gathering locations where people can meet outside of home and work

STATUS: *Ongoing*

SPECIFIC ACCOMPLISHMENTS: Development of the greenway trail as well as maintenance of the Tualatin Commons, and all the parks facilitate this item. Additionally, in Basalt Creek a small area has been identified for a commercial uses.

Encourage environmentally-friendly products and energy-efficiency in new construction and remodels

STATUS: **Ongoing**

SPECIFIC ACCOMPLISHMENTS: The state adopted the 2017 Oregon Residential Specialty Code which is a change to this effort since last year. Energy efficiency requirements for residential and commercial structures are a continuous emphasis within Building Codes nation wide.

Conduct an industry cluster analysis to identify advantages, growth opportunities and workforce needs

STATUS: *Underway*

SPECIFIC ACCOMPLISHMENTS: Economic Development staff are completing a industry cluster analysis report in the City.

Target business recruitment to attract firms that grow employment and build community wealth

STATUS: *Ongoing*

SPECIFIC ACCOMPLISHMENTS: Economic Development staff are at the very beginning phases of updating the Strategic Plan. Part of this work may include conducting an Economic Opportunities Analysis.

Ensure infrastructure capacity and facility planning is aligned with future employer growth projections

STATUS: *Ongoing*

SPECIFIC ACCOMPLISHMENTS: Public Works is currently updating several master plans including Water, Sewer, and Storm.

Facilitate housing options that meet wage projections and employee preferences

STATUS: *Ongoing*

SPECIFIC ACCOMPLISHMENTS: The Accessory Dwelling Unit code is being updated to reflect state law. A housing discussion is starting in the community, including the Aging Task Force, and this will likely emerge as a topic in Phase II of the Tualatin Development Code Improvement Project when broader policy actions are identified.

Establish a single point-of-entry for business investors and developers

STATUS: Complete/ongoing

SPECIFIC ACCOMPLISHMENTS: The Economic Development team facilitates this single point-of-entry. The team consists of an Economic Development Manager, Community Development Director, and City Manager.

Create a city-businesses economic development partnership to track and coordinate opportunities

STATUS: Complete/ongoing

SPECIFIC ACCOMPLISHMENTS: Economic development staff visit businesses to build relationships, participate in Greater Portland Inc and work with Business Oregon to track opportunities.

Prioritize businesses that provide family-wage jobs (defined as \$40k + by US Census 2010)

STATUS: Complete/ongoing

SPECIFIC ACCOMPLISHMENTS: Economic Development staff are at the very beginning phases of updating a the Strategic Plan. Part of this work may include conducting an Economic Opportunities Analysis.

Identify and facilitate development of business that enhances downtown retail opportunities

STATUS: Complete/ongoing

SPECIFIC ACCOMPLISHMENTS: This action could be part of a downtown or City Center plan that may be identified as a priority in Phase II of the Tualatin Development Code Improvement Project when broader policy actions are identified.

Provide guidance and incentives for small and family-owned businesses

STATUS: Complete

SPECIFIC ACCOMPLISHMENTS: A Permitting Guide for Food and Beverage Establishments was created in 2017. In addition, a Small Business Toolkit is available to assist with the permitting process.

JOHNSON ECONOMICS was retained by the City of Tualatin to collect and analyze data on Tualatin's housing stock in order to inform a discussion regarding housing availability and affordability within the city. This memo presents the data and the sources used in the collection process.

INVENTORY

We estimate that the City of Tualatin currently has a total inventory of 11,346 residential units. Of these, 53% are single-family detached units; 7% are single-family attached units; and 40% are multi-family units. The figures are derived from geocoded taxlot data (Oct 2016), provided by Metro.




FIGURE 1: HOUSING INVENTORY BY TYPE OF STRUCTURE (4Q16)



PRICE LEVELS

The charts included on the following two pages display the price distribution in Tualatin for ownership and rental housing by type of structure. Sales prices are based on transactions from the past 12 months, recorded in the RMLS system, including active and pending listings. Single-family rents are based on listings on various online platforms from the past three years, collected by Rainmaker, adjusted to current levels via a rent index developed from average rents in the Tigard-Tualatin-Sherwood market, as reported by Multifamily NW. Multi-family rents were collected by Johnson Economics for this analysis through a survey of 23 multi-family projects, covering 89% of the city's multi-family rental stock.



For ownership housing, the single family attached classification includes townhomes and duplexes with a common wall. The multi-family category represents condominiums. These same definitions apply to the rental units, with multi-family units largely reflecting traditional rental apartments.

VACANCY

Based on our survey of apartment projects in Tualatin, which represents 89% of all multi-family rentals and 69% of the entire rental stock in the city, we estimate that there are around 240 vacant units available for rent in Tualatin. These represent a vacancy rate of 4.2%, somewhat lower than what is considered a balanced market. If we exclude the newly opened River Ridge Apartments, which had 100 vacant units at the time of our survey, the vacancy rate is 2.8%.

Within the ownership segment, the best measure of vacancy is the Census Bureau's American Community Survey, which in its most recent dataset (2011-15) reports 20 units vacant and available for sale within Tualatin. This represents 0.4% of the total stock of ownership housing. For context, 45 ownership homes are currently listed for sale in the city.




FIGURE 4: VACANCY BY HOUSING TENURE

REGULATED AFFORDABLE HOUSING

Based on data from HUD and Oregon Housing and Community Services (OHCS), there are three regulated affordable housing projects in Tualatin. These are Woodridge Apartments (264 units), Tualatin Meadows (240 units), and Terrace View Apartments (100 units). Together, the properties total 604 units, accounting for 11% of the city's rental stock. All three projects are restricted to households with incomes below 60% of the area's median family income (MFI).




According to the Washington County Department of Housing Services, Tualatin currently has 127 households receiving Section 8 housing vouchers. The Oregon Section 8 (Housing Choice Voucher) Program is a federally sponsored program that helps low-income households in the state of Oregon to find and pay for affordable housing. The program operates on a free to choose basis where the participants are issued with a housing choice voucher and are free to choose a housing unit of their choice provided it meets the programs health and safety measures. To qualify for the program, applicants must typically have an income that is less than 50% of the area's median income. Applicants must also be residents of the state of Oregon and either US national or registered legal aliens.
